2 March (8.15–12.30): American cinema and the past

- Cinematic reflections of society and culture
- Reflections on the past: Origin myths (*Birth of a Nation, 1492: Conquest of Paradise*)
 - o Nostalgia for the West (*Stagecoach*; *Unforgiven*; *Dances with Wolves*; *Lone Ranger*)
 - o Dealings with the Other: masters and slaves (Gone with the Wind; 12 Years a Slave)
 - o Recent history (Vietnam, the Middle East) (*Forrest Gump; Green Zone; American Sniper*)

6 April (13.15–17.15): American cinema and the present

- Anxieties concerning law and order: film noir, thriller, crime (*Godfather; The Irishman, Fracture*)
- Moral anxieties: the American family (*Kramer vs Kramer, The Stepford Wives; Marriage Story*) and work ethics (*The Wolf of Wall Street, Nightcrawler; Money Monster*)
- Social issues: racial conflicts, class divides (*Crash*; *The Help, Hidden Figures, Good Will Hunting*)
- Institutional crimes, problems of representation (Spotlight; The Post; Bombshell)

25 May (13.15–17.15): American cinema and the future – DAN 214, in person!

- Present or future? Apocalyptic visions of epidemics, climate change, terrorism (*Contagion*)
- Anxieties about the future in young adult films (*The Hunger Games, Divergent, Maze Runner*)
- Post-apocalyptic dystopias (Interstellar, Blade Runner 2049; Dune)
- Technology as a Threat or an Opportunity Artificial Intelligence (*Ex Machina, The Martian, Minority Report*)

Requirements:

- active participation (no more than 5 hours/one day missed)
- two reflections (appr. 500 words each) about the film(s) you watch for the 2nd and 3rd occasion; you can focus on one or more of the topics/issues raised; reflect on one or more specific films; ask questions, mention other films with a similar topic, etc. You don't need to do any research for this task, just describe your impressions, tell me your opinion feel free to be critical, personal, subjective be yourself! Deadline: the Sunday after each class (7 April, 26 May)
- watching films at home
- home essay (appr. 2000 words), analysing an American film (or comparing several films), interpreting its representation of some social or cultural issue, deadline: **31 May**
