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THE DIALECTAL DIVERSITY OF ARMENIAN

For the modern period, one usually distinguishes around fifty or sixty modern Armenian dialects, several of which are now extinct. Armenian dialectal diversity existed in the prehistoric period, before the 5th century CE.

The dialectal diversity also existed during the Indo-European dispersal, when Pre-Armenian/Proto-Armenian was dialectally close to Greek, Indo-Iranian, and possibly Phrygian and a few other branches. Within this hypothetical dialect group, Proto-Armenian was situated between Proto-Greek (to the west) and Proto-Indo-Iranian (to the east). On the northern side, it might have bordered, notably, Proto-Balto-Slavic.
